New Ways of Dealing with Conflicts and Autocracies Versus Traditional Criminal Prosecution

From 30 September until 2 October 2019, federal judges, lawyers and academics from Argentina, Germany and Columbia met at the University of Buenos Aires to discuss ways of dealing with past autocracies and violent conflicts. The conference focused on the opportunities and limits of traditional legal instruments and concepts of transitional justice. Based on specific national approaches, which are closely linked to the respective nation's administration of justice, the articles in this conference transcript offer not only insights into the respective legal systems but also important findings on the social context of the different ways of coming to terms with an adversarial and authoritarian past.
